Our intrepid reporter Tom Carrington has been busy of late, with organising the annual Pub of the Year Competition in Newark, reporting on yet another milestone for Just Beer and attending beer awards. Well someone's got to do it! Here's his report:

NEWARK PUB OF THE YEAR 2016

Each year Newark CAMRA present an award to the best pub in the branch area. Any CAMRA member can nominate their favourite pub to be considered as the Pub of the Year (POTY) and all those nominated are judged by volunteers from the branch. Closing date for nominations is the October branch meeting and results are announced following a meeting of the branch committee and all judges in January. This year eight pubs, Final Whistle and Old Coach House in Southwell, Flying Circus, Just Beer Micropub, Oscar's Inn, Prince Rupert, Organ Grinder and Vaults Cider and Ale House in Newark were in the competition and nine judges volunteered



to do the scoring using CAMRA's POTY judging criteria. Each judge's results are converted into ranking points to reveal the winner. The competition proved to be very close with judges being very impressed with the standards of all the pubs.



The results were announced at a meeting on 25th January, with Just Beer Micropub being the winner of the 2016 Newark CAMRA POTY, and will go forward to the next stage of the competition, the Nottinghamshire CAMRA POTY, the winner of the county POTY then enters the regional stage of the competition and the regional winners progressing again. The national CAMRA POTY being announced in February.

The presentation of the 2016 award took place at Just Beer on 28th February, when I was pleased to hand over the trophy and certificate to Phil Ayling, Paul Murphy, Duncan Neil and Stuart Young. Five beers were on sale during the afternoon and Ian Dobbs thanked Suzanne Neil for producing the excellent buffet

3000 ALES & COUNTING

Whilst attending the CAMRA AGM, Newark CAMRA member Phil Ayling heard about the opening of the first micropub The Butchers Arms in Herne, he returned to Newark with an idea to open something similar in the town specialising just in cask ales.

At first quite a few people had the opinion that it would never work. However, with three more people on board, suitable premises were found and on the 4th of August 2010 Just Beer Micropub opened and the 4 tapsters Phil, Paul Murphy, Stuart Young and Duncan Neil began serving thirsty customers.

The vision of just selling cask ale never totally materialised but cask has proved to be the main attraction. Real cider and perries have always been available and snacks such as locally produced pork scratchings and pickled eggs are also sold.

The pub was awarded Newark CAMRA Pub of the Year, Nottinghamshire Pub of the Year, East Midlands Pub of the Year and Newark Business of the Year in 2012, and Newark Pub of the Year again in 2013 and 2014.

Over the last five years other products have been added to the range including British and World craft beers in bottles and cans from the fridge.

However, the number of cask ales continued to increase and 2004 days after opening Just Beer reached the milestone of 3000 different cask ales from over 1000 different breweries from all over the United Kingdom. This was reached on the opening day of the 5th Beermuda Triangle beer festival which is organised by Pubs in Newark Together (PINT), a group that the pub is very active in. To mark this achievement Newark CAMRA chairman presented a certificate to the pub.

CHAMPION BEER OF NOTTINGHAM 2016

On 18th February the fourth Champion beer of Nottinghamshire competition took place at the Canalhouse in Nottingham. All of the breweries in the county are invited to supply two beers from their regular range, this year 25 breweries supplied 51 beers, which were divided into five categories.

The two beers judged to be the best from each category are forwarded for final judging to find the overall winner, the other nine beers are classed as runners-up. Once judging is complete the function room of the pub was open to the public to enjoy the fares on offer, the beer festival then ran for the rest of the weekend.






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OUT ON A JOLLY IN THE FENS

An entry in the Nottingham Drinker caught my attention. Ray Kirby was rallying a troop of Nottingham branch stalwarts to visit the annual Whittlesea Straw Bear Festival on Saturday 16th January 2016.

Now I am fairly familiar with Olde English customs & folklore like mumming plays ("I can cure the itch, the stitch, the palsy & the gout, the pains within & the pains without..."), morris dancers - even the Staffordshire horn dancers (no, it's not pubescent boys at a school disco) - but I'd never heard of straw bears before. So I was curious.

Whittlesea (a.k.a. Whittlesey) is an ancient fenland market town six miles east of Peterborough. Since time immemorial it was customary on the Tuesday after Plough Monday (which is the first Monday after 12th Night) to dress a "plough boy" in straw. The Straw Bear would then be lead around town by his "keeper" along a specific route, including all the pubs, accepting gifts of beer/food/money. It was thought to celebrate the end of winter and the straw used in the costume is usually burned on the following Sunday, after which a plough(share) is blessed in the local St Mary's church. The tradition was stopped in 1909 when the local police chief thought it smacked of scrounging.

Fortunately it was revived in 1980 and so is now in its 37th year as a festival.

In its present form the festival now starts slightly later than Plough Tuesday, this year on Friday 15th January, with an evening concert of various folk music acts. Saturday sees the procession of the bear, 10.30-15.30, followed by a barn dance in the evening (the straw burning and church



blessing being on the Sunday).

This straw bear procession is the only one of its kind in the British Isles

although there seems to be others in Germany & parts of Eastern Europe. On the Saturday it attracted a huge gathering of folk dancers. The following sides were expected:- 14 Morris, 9 Molly, 5 Clog, 4 Linked Swords, 1 Mixed Rattlejag (broom, bacca pipe & sword dances apparently) and 1 Appalachian.

Three of us ventured from Newark (including the Queen of Cider/Cribbage) by train (it's down to Peterborough Station & then one stop eastbound) and managed to meet up with the Nottinghamsters. There are some excellent pubs in Whittlesea (there's even a 'Spoons) and they all make a special effort, which is why it's a magnet for CAMRA members. We unfortunately missed most of the procession and dancers due to beer/cider (rhubarb cider proved popular!) tasting commitments but I'll certainly try and return next year.

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CYPRUS REAL ALE MICROBREWERY GETS THE FINAL GO-AHEAD!



The Yorkshire-family-owners of the Paphos-based Aphrodite's Rock Microbrewery & Brewpub, the first licensed microbrewery in Cyprus, tell CAMRA the incredible story of how they overcame years of the former administration's rampant bureaucracy to start their brewery.

WHY DID YOU DECIDE TO START A MICROBREWERY IN CYPRUS?

William Ginn, 'Bill', said, "I'm a Chartered Engineer in the oil industry and have travelled all my life. We wanted to start a family business and saw real potential to establish a microbrewery in beautiful Paphos where we had happily settled along with many other British expatriates.

Melanie, his daughter, studied in Sunderland as one of a growing band of British women brewers. Then, in 2010, we prepared a full business plan for CIPA, the Cyprus Investment Promotion Agency, who agreed to assist us.

We didn't enter into this lightly nor, knowing Cyprus, did we expect things to be easy but no market research, business plan or MBA could have prepared us for the government nightmare to follow..."

WHAT WERE THE PROBLEMS YOU ENCOUNTERED IN CYPRUS?

"We found an old defunct winery in a lush green valley in the hills above Paphos. The size was perfect plus it was full of charm and character with all permits as a 'winery'. CIPA said the 'Change of Use' application to 'brewery', "... should be straightforward". It was, however, Easter 2012, eighteen months of continuous and largely unnecessary work later, before our thick dossier of documentation was complete. We were assured all was in order and we "...should receive the Permit to Brew in a week". Imagine our shock on receiving notification from Nicosia not with our promised Permit to Brew but with further demands, then further and then still further unreasonable and, often, impossible demands.

It must be said that Jean, my wife, and I were treated very badly during these years and our health undoubtedly suffered. It turned out that CIPA was, in fact, powerless to help. It almost felt as if there was a deliberate attempt by the government to drive us out of Cyprus for some reason!

We persevered and met all demands making it clear we would not just meekly go away. Customs & Excise then dropped their bombshell, never previously



mentioned, that should we ever receive a Permit to Brew we must pay a €51,000 bond and have a full-time Inspector on our premises whose salary and all expenses would be to our account. The cost could be well over €100,000pa; a crippling sum for a small family business."

TO BRUSSELS AND THE EUROPEAN PARLIAMENT...

Bill said "With no options left to us, and feeling very alone, we took this to the European Parliament in Brussels with the support of our former Yorkshire MEPs." Questions put to the European Commission in 2012, were:

"Will the Commission investigate whether the difficulties and very long delays experienced by Aphrodite's Rock Brewing Company in its attempts to open for business in Cyprus are a function of:

- *The existence of non-tariff trading barriers*
- *The Cypriot authorities manipulating regulations to prevent or discourage competition*
- *Tacit and potentially illegal bureaucratic connivance in favour of existing Cypriot business*

And, whether the brewing sector in Cyprus is operating in accordance with the requirements of all relevant aspects of EU law"

"After nearly four years of struggles our Permit to Brew was finally granted with the resident Inspector and bond requirements dropped."

Bill said, "After all those years of Cyprus bureaucracy, I nearly called our Irish Red Ale 'Red Tape!'" He added, "Finally, however, we can say that a holiday in the 'Med' no longer condemns CAMRA real ale drinkers to long days of bland, commercial lagers. Cheap flights and low cost accommodation make even a long weekend break possible so come to our little oasis in Paphos in 2016 and have a few great days with us!"

The family's tenacity and determination to bring this much demanded microbrewery to fruition in Cyprus is to be commended. Institutional problems continue for them but they say the support and solidarity shown by fellow CAMRA members, and friends & family, visiting them in Paphos is a great help.

APHRODITE'S ROCK MICROBREWERY & BREWPUB TODAY

Aphrodite's Rock Microbrewery & Brewpub is in a lovely old winery 15 minutes from Paphos surrounded by beautiful olive groves and grape vine terraces. You can take in the views sat in the traditional stone courtyard shaded by walnut, hazelnut and mulberry trees and also enjoy regular live entertainment staged for your pleasure. The kitchen offers delicious, great value-for-money meals plus authentic hand-stretched Italian pizzas

baked-to-order in an Italian wood-fired oven. "Portions are generous - come hungry, you won't leave that way!" Bill said. You can also join the highly popular, informative and complimentary Brewery Tour held every Monday to Friday after lunch.



Despite its stunning location, great restaurant and warm ambience, Aphrodite's Rock Microbrewery & Brewpub is still, first-and-foremost, a microbrewery. Quality real ales and real ciders are brewed by Head Brewer, Melanie, and her team for tourists and residents alike. There are six core beers ranging from Yorkshire Rose, a best bitter at 3.8% to West Coast IPA, an American style pale at 6.0%. Bill says "We currently have about 100 outlets, eg bars, restaurants, tavernas, hotels, etc including the British and American Forces Bases here on the island, but many are simply purchasing the occasional crate. We do, however, have a number of full draft outlets mainly operated by expat British owners who know how to keep a good pint of real ale. The full range of our products is only available from our Brewpub. Our hand-pulled real ale in our Brewpub is very popular with our British expat and tourist customer base as well as other Europeans, Americans, Australians and New Zealanders. Our beers are also very popular with our Russian guests who particularly like 'live beer' being unfiltered, unpasteurised and complete with a load of additional brewer's yeast - you can almost chew it. I hasten to add that all our beers are, of course, unpasteurised. Our real ales are brewed more towards easy drinkability than equivalent styles in the cooler climate of the UK but with a good complex flavour profile. Our London Porter is the only real ale that is not 100% malt and in this we add a small controlled amount of local carob which just lifts the chocolate/coffee profile without making this heavy-going as some porters - it gives it a true taste of Cyprus."

BREWERY NEWS

BREWSTERS

Bottles of Aromantica 4.2%, Aromatic Porter 4.5% Hop A Doodle Doo 4.3% Pale Ale 5% and India Pale Ale 6% are available in the brewery shop along with mini kegs of Hophead and Marquis (to order).

They are planning to hold an open day sometime in the Spring to invite the local CAMRA groups to visit; Dates to be announced.

A collaboration with various other brewsters to celebrate International Women's Day is in the planning stages.

MALLARD

Bottles produced for the Xmas period have all been sold. Extra member of staff employed to answer the phones and deal with sales. Steve is planning to produce a Mild in May brew.

MILESTONE

The Brewery has begun producing craft beers in both cask and keg versions. The beers are Boston Bitter 5.0%, Lindum Pale 6.0%, Helles Lager 5.0% and Hoggpenny Porter 4.9%.

A new keg line is now also in use. Milestone also produced 6 Cask Beers for the Rugby Union.

Home Internationals namely English Rose 4.5%, Scotland the Brave 5.0%, Welsh Dragon 4.1%, Italia 4.8%, Luck of the Irish 4.8% and French Cockerel 4.9%. All are in the style of a Bitter.

NEWARK

Still producing core range of nine beers, none dark. Brewing twice a week. As well as Newark the

brewery is trading in other parts of the country through swaps. Plans for new brews are currently under wraps. The brewery hosted the February Newark branch meeting.

NEWBY WYKE

England Expects 4.6% was brewed as part of a Small Beers promotion for the Six Nations Championship. HMS Illustrious 4.4% will be this year's St. George's Day beer and will be yellow hued in colour.

Yamato a Japanese style beer, named after the world's biggest ever battleship, has been brewed using Japanese hops and ingredients.

The next New-k-Ham creation from the Pugwash series, by those two extrovert brewers from Newby Wyke and Oakham Ales will be called Master Mate 4.5% followed by Roger the Cabin Boy.

The end of April will see Newby Wyke travelling to the Pegas Brewery in Brno, to brew a second joint beer Marie Celeste 4.6%.

TOM HERRICKS

Building work continues but still awaiting the delivery of the vessels, the pilot plant is still being used to brew whilst this is ongoing.
